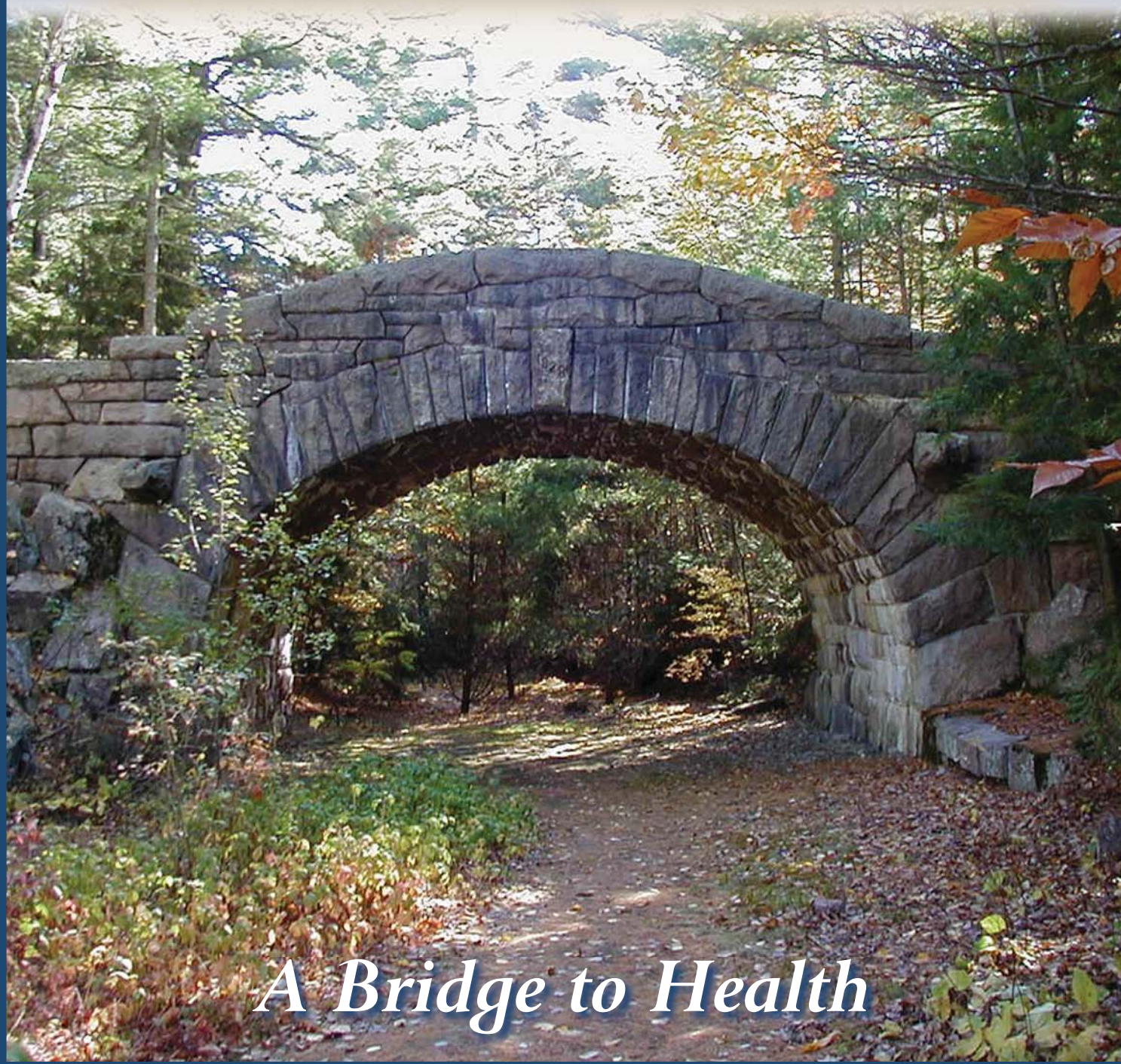

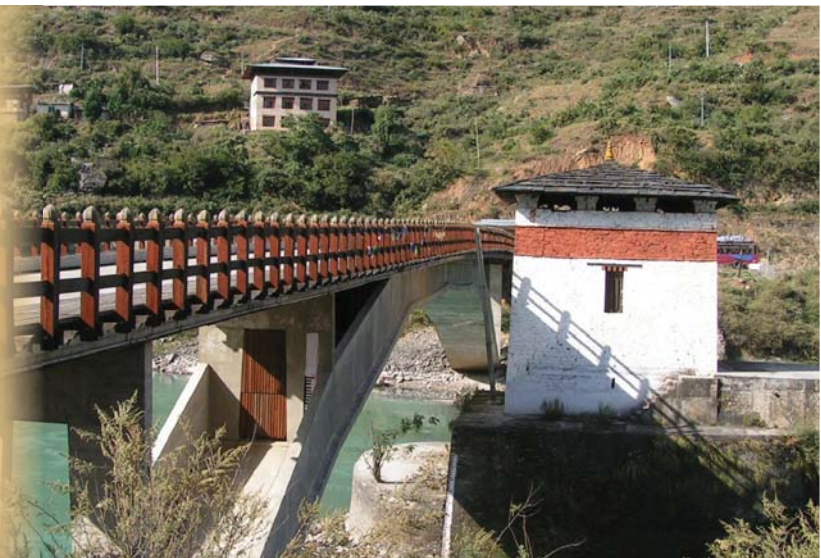

A Message from the Chairman of the Board of the Ohio Physicians Health Program

I would like to congratulate the Ohio Physicians Health Program (OPHP) on a profitable year. 2006 was a profitable year, not in monetary terms, but rather in the measurement of saving lives and saving careers. OPHP offers services and independent monitoring programs that support the health and well being of physicians and other healthcare professionals. Through our focus to help doctors and other healthcare professionals, we are increasing the safety for Ohio's patients.

On a daily basis, OPHP receives calls from a variety of individuals who may be in need of help or guidance. Some calls are fielded from physicians who may have a problem, remain anonymous, and seek information regarding their various options. Many calls are from hospital staff members and leaders of medical staffs who may have a concern about the health of a colleague and request information on how the individual or situation should be addressed. These calls are received by OPHP's Medical Director or by a Case Manager who is a trained chemical dependency counselor. If you or someone you know is suffering from issues such as substance use disorders, physical and psychiatric illness, mental/behavioral health disorder, disruptive behavior or aging, I encourage you to seek the consultation and intervention assistance offered by OPHP.

Throughout 2006, OPHP managed a total of 463 cases, an increase

from 449 in 2005. 76% of these cases concerned chemical dependency or substance use disorder. 24% obtained assistance of OPHP due to other difficulties, such as stress or burnout, mental or psychiatric illness, depression, disruptive behavior, boundary violations or crossings, age-related problems and others. When appropriate, OPHP assists with interventions to encourage an individual to seek evaluation and treatment.

I have enjoyed watching OPHP develop and grow over the last several years. I would like to express my appreciation to the staff for the great services they provide. I would also like to express my gratitude to our many supporters who help make it possible to facilitate the health and wellness of healthcare professionals in order to enhance patient safety. We owe a large debt of gratitude to the Ohio Medical Quality Foundation, as they continue to be our largest financial supporter. Other significant financial support comes from the Ohio Department of Drug and Alcohol Addiction Services, which allows our educational programs to be available throughout the state, and OHIC Insurance Company.

Robert K. Rupp, J.D. is a graduate of the Ohio State University Michael E. Moritz College of Law and is a business lawyer and partner at Baker & Hostetler LLP. OPHP has a rich history of values, dedication, commitment, and service in living its mission, to facilitate the health and wellness of healthcare professionals in order to enhance patient safety, through advocating for and supporting the health of physician colleagues, residents, medical students, dentists, veterinarians, and other healthcare professionals. OPHP also serves as a valuable resource for medical schools, hospitals and medical staffs through education and consultation.

Former and current staff members are the past and present bearers of this rich legacy. There are also the many volunteer monitors throughout the state who generously contribute their time and service. They are examples of the values and dedication that OPHP was founded upon in the mid-1970's by members of the Ohio State Medical Association. In 2006, volunteer monitors contributed nearly fifteen hundred hours of time in support of their colleagues and OPHP. What an outstanding example of values and altruism.

In 2006, two staff members left to assume positions in other cities. Edward J. Poczekaj, M.A., Senior Case Manager, moved to Toledo, Ohio, to work with EAP and the DOT. Rosie Clark, Executive Assistant, relocated to Phoenix, Arizona. Their contributions to OPHP and its mission have been significant and they will be missed.

New staff members Kelley Long, B.A. and Jennifer L. Vecchio bring a spirit of dedication, enthusiasm, and teamwork along with other qualities including computer and technology skills.

OPHP serves hundreds of physicians and other healthcare professionals annually, as well as hospital and medical staff leaders, medical schools, and hospitals. Thirty lectures were delivered across the state during the year. Within this report are measurable indicators and outcomes of our activities and the impact of our services, one being the noticeable increase in the number of medical students and residents receiving OPHP services. Unsolicited comments of appreciation appear throughout the report reflecting the importance and impact of OPHP services.

We are grateful to the individuals and organizations who provided financial and other forms of support to OPHP during 2006. The Ohio Medical Quality Foundation (OMQF) is the primary funder

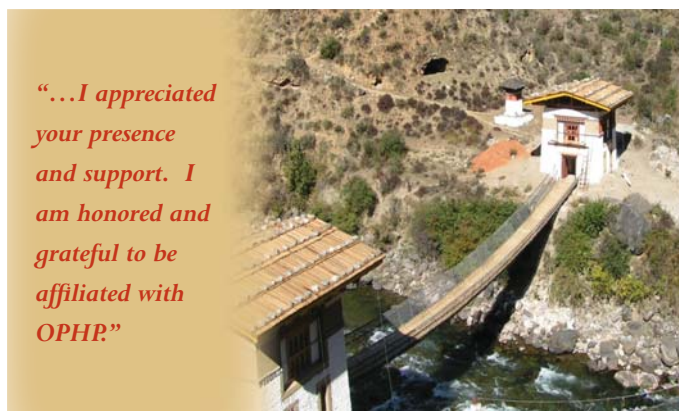
of OPHP, with other major funding coming from the Ohio Department of Alcohol and Drug Addiction Services (ODADAS), and OHIC Insurance Company.

The OPHP Winter 2006-2007 Newsletter was expanded to 12 pages to allow for the acknowledgement of the many individuals and institutions that provided funding and other forms of support during 2006. This impressive list is an indicator of the success of the OPHP fund development program. This issue also contained an ODADAS column, communicating important information to all Ohio physicians.

In 2006, OPHP participated in phase I of a Robert Wood Johnson National Study of Physician Health Programs conducted in collaboration with the Federation of State Physician Programs. I feel privileged and grateful to serve in the area of physician health and to work with an outstanding staff and organization along with a dedicated Board of Trustees. I look forward to 2007.

About Our Program

The Ohio Physicians Health Program is a 501(c)(3) not-for-profit organization that serves as a confidential resource for physicians, residents, medical students, and other healthcare professionals who may be affected by substance use disorders or other issues impacting their health and well being. It assists family members, colleagues, group practices, health systems, and hospitals who have concerns about a physician or other healthcare professional.

Program services include:

- Consultation and resource identification for
 - Substance use disorders
 - Physical and psychiatric illness

- Mental/behavioral health
- “Disruptive behavior” including boundary issues
- Aging
- Recovery documentation services (advocacy)
- Intervention
- Stress management
- Education

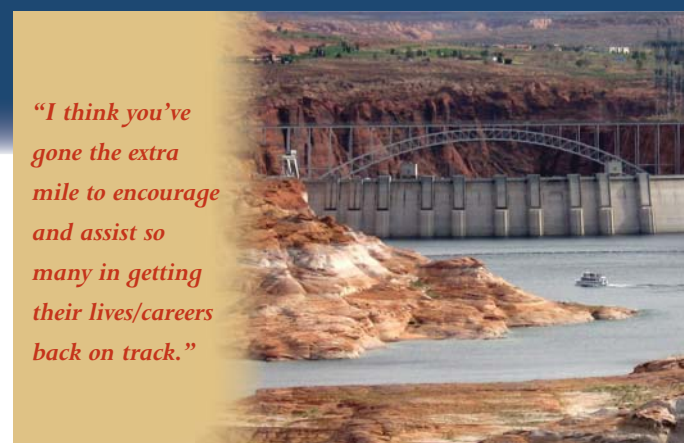
Through its commitment to the health and well being of Ohio’s physicians and other healthcare professionals, OPHP contributes to the health, safety, and welfare of all the citizens of Ohio.

History of OPHP

In 1973, The American Medical Association recommended that state medical associations develop programs to help physicians impaired by alcohol, drug abuse, mental/emotional problems, and problems of aging. The Ohio State Medical Association (OSMA) responded through the establishment of an Impaired Physicians Committee (later changed to Physicians Effectiveness Committee). The Committee began with several volunteer physicians. In less than two years, it grew to approximately 25 physicians from throughout Ohio.

The Committee organized a Physicians Effectiveness Program (PEP) developing a mechanism to assist physician colleagues throughout the state regarding concerns about their health or well being. Despite the hard work and dedication of the volunteer physicians, the PEP had a significant weakness. The majority of volunteer physicians had little or no experience or training in intervening with impaired physicians. During the late 1980s, the Committee began working on the development of a funded, fulltime program with professional staff. In early 1991, OSMA became a major sponsor, including staff liaison services, for the first three years of operation.

Subsequently, OSMA and several individuals lobbied vigorously to obtain major funding from the newly-organized Ohio Medical Quality Foundation (OMQF). Through these efforts funding was obtained into the year 2001 at which time OMQF provided additional funding for a comprehensive review of OPEP. This study

resulted in OMQF providing additional funding for a full-time President and Medical Director in 2002.

In the year 2004, the Board of Trustees changed the name of the organization to Ohio Physicians Health Program (OPHP) to better reflect the services and activities of the organization. This change was occurring with other state programs as well.

OPHP initially was formed to assist physicians with substance use disorders and impairment issues. Today, with stress and pressures on the rise among physicians and other health care professionals for a variety of reasons, expansion of services and activities to support all aspects of the health and well being of physicians are necessary. OPHP has responded to these needs through expanded services, education programs, increased visibility, ease of accessibility and establishment of relationships and networks with local physician health committees, medical staff leadership, hospital administration, residency directors, medical schools, etc.

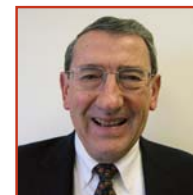
Betsy S. Arvidson, B.A.

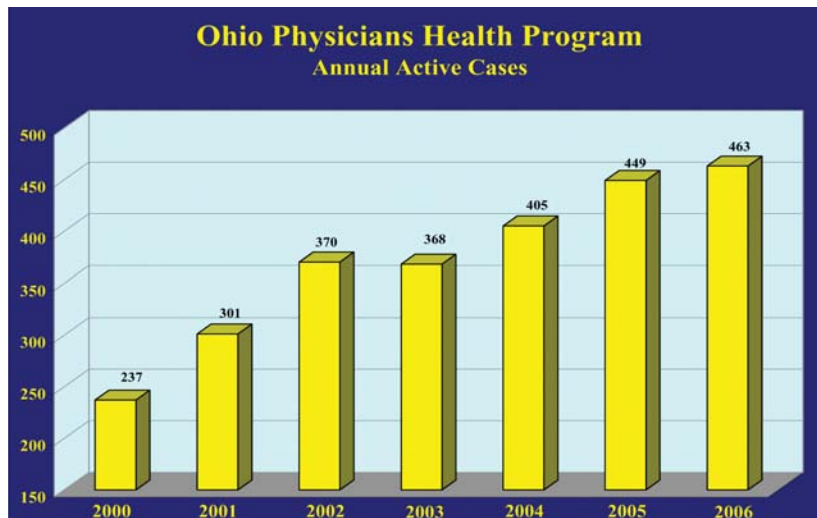
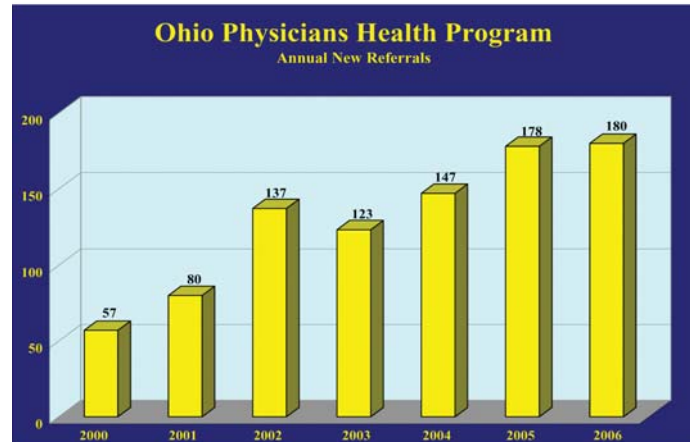


Robert D. Clinger, B.A.

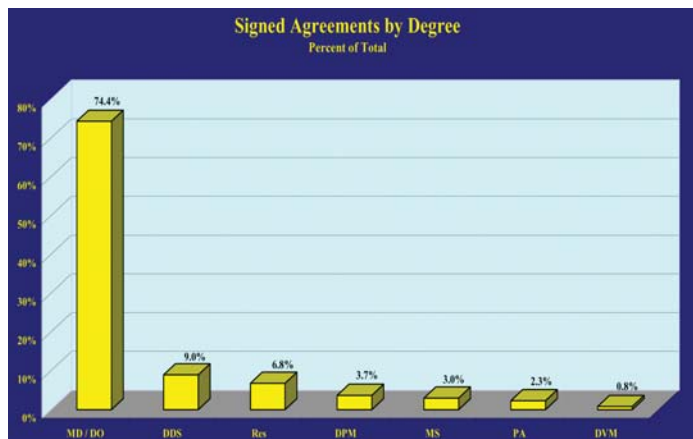
2006 Year in Review

The graph below depicts new referrals of physicians and other healthcare professionals during 2006 as well as active cases. There is a 95% increase in active cases over the year 2000. The graph to the right shows the annual number of referrals to the Ohio Physicians Health Program (OPHP). 180 new referrals in 2006, received services such as consultation, intervention, referral, monitoring, education, recovery documentation, and advocacy.

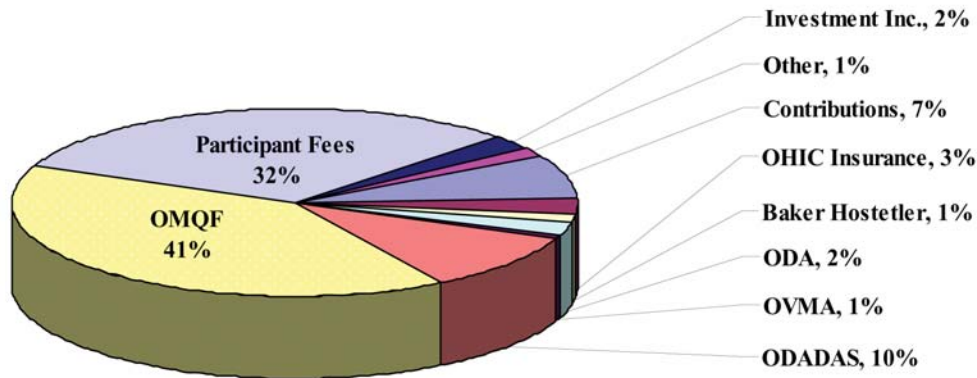

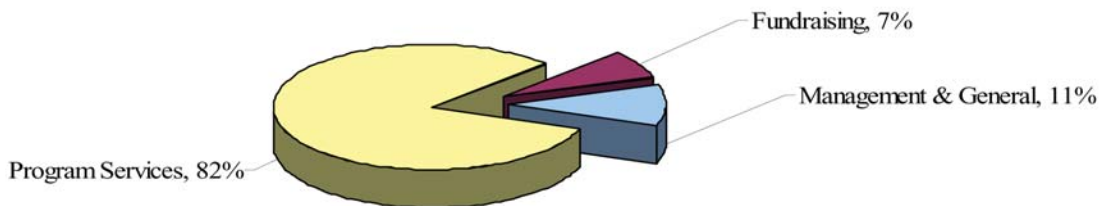
2006 Year in Review

Revenue Sources

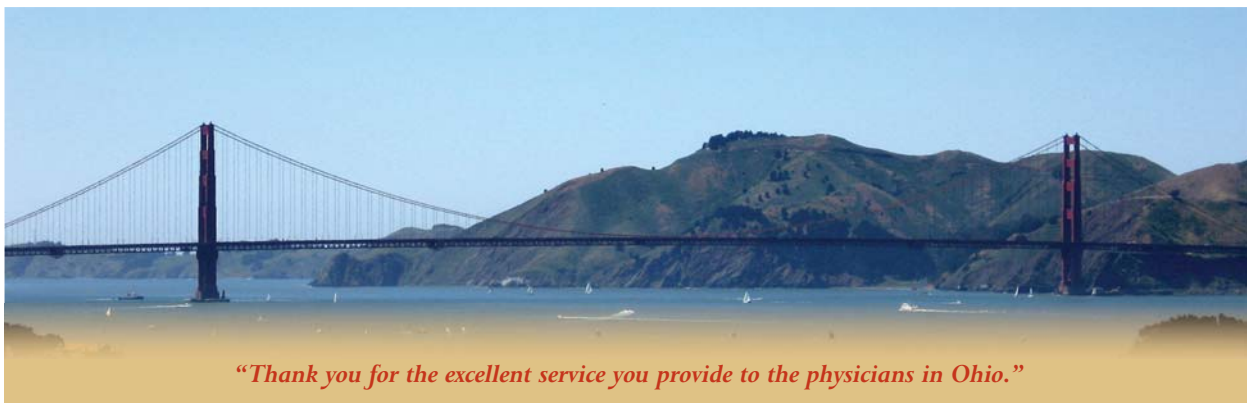


The Ohio Physicians Health Program's major source of funding is the Ohio Medical Quality Foundation (OMQF), providing 41 percent of total revenue in 2006. Participant fees accounted for 32 percent of OPHP's revenue in 2006. Other organizations providing financial support include the Ohio Department of Alcohol and Drug Addiction Services (ODADAS), OHIC Insurance Company, Ohio Dental Association (ODA), Ohio Veterinary Medical Association (OMVA), and Baker & Hostetler LLP. Individual and institutional financial support, which includes annual giving, provided 7 percent of OPHP's total revenue.

Functional Expenses



The Ohio Physicians Health Program is a responsible steward in the use of its resources as reflected in this functional expenses pie chart. In 2006, 82 percent of OPHP's operational expense was in the actual delivery of services to physicians, residents, medical students, dentists, veterinarians, other healthcare professionals, hospitals, medical staff leaders, medical schools, and others.

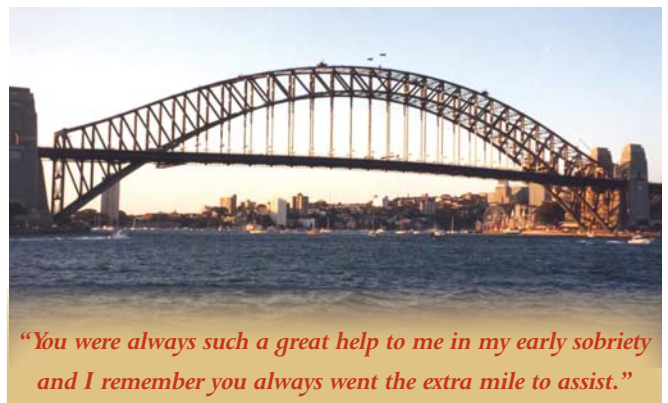
