A Message from the President and Medical Director

It is an honor and a privilege to have served as President and Medical Director of the Ohio Physicians Health Program (OPHP) these last six years. As I will be stepping down from this position in 2009 I want to take this opportunity to express my appreciation and gratitude to the OPHP staff, members of our Board of Trustees and the many individuals and organizations behind the daily operations, growth and development of this fine organization. During these stressful times being experienced by physicians and other health care professionals, the OPHP mission of *facilitating the health and wellness of health care professionals in order to enhance patient safety* has never been more important.

OPHP enhances patient safety through education, prevention, coaching, and intervening when issues arise that may impact the health and wellbeing of physicians, dentists, residents, medical students and other health care professionals. Medical families, hospitals, medical colleges, and countless others throughout Ohio benefit both directly and indirectly from the critical services provided by OPHP. Though not a part of the State Medical Board of Ohio, OPHP has an “arm’s length” working relationship with the board and a similar mission of public protection.

The citizens of Ohio realize a greater level of public safety because of OPHP, and distressed physicians and other health care professionals have a place to turn for assistance. As Nancy Nielson, M.D., PhD, current president of the American Medical Association, stated at a recent international conference on doctors health, “If the healer is not healthy, the patients will not be healthy.”

The theme of this year’s report embraces *time* and draws attention to the importance of carving out or making time for one’s own health, family, and wellbeing. The cover picture is an astrological sundial with the *gnomon* having 12 steps leading to its top. A coincidence and perhaps a metaphor is the 12 steps of Alcoholics Anonymous which are tools that many OPHP participants and others find helpful in their personal journeys of recovery, healing, and wholeness.

Since the year 2000, OPHP has experienced a 100% increase in number of cases while annual referrals have increased 260% during that period of time. The high volume of referrals includes a broad scope of problems and issues. Historically, the vast majority of cases involved substance use disorders. However, in response to the needs of physicians and other health care professionals dealing with stress, burnout, mental/emotional illness, disruptive behavior, physical illness, professional boundary issues, aging, etc., OPHP, like other state physicians health programs, has responded to these needs with expanded services. Physicians who are enrolled with OPHP for monitoring and recovery documentation services experience recovery and success rates similar or higher than those reported in the medical literature.

OPHP’s 150 volunteer monitors throughout the state who give of their time and expertise in supporting the health and wellbeing of their professional colleagues are an integral part of participants’ individual success

stories. On behalf of all OPHP participants, I thank you.

The activities and accomplishments detailed in this report would not have been possible without the support of the Ohio Medical Quality Foundation (OMQF), Ohio Department of Alcohol and Drug Addiction Services (ODADAS), The Doctors Company (TDC), and the many hospitals, medical staffs, and individuals that provide annual gifts to OPHP.

My third term as director of the Central Region of the Federation of State Physician Health Programs (FSPHP) will conclude in 2009. I have been privileged to serve on the FSPHP Board of Trustees and various board committees these last six years. Benefits to OPHP of this participation at national and international levels have included extensive networking; exposure to and awareness of best practices; new knowledge; research; and keeping abreast of current developments in the area of physician health and wellbeing.

In conclusion I want to express my gratitude to Robert K. Rupp, J.D., Chair of the OPHP Board of Trustees. His commitment and capable leadership, along with other board members, has guided OPHP in its growth and development to a place of national recognition. I trust OPHP supporters are pleased with the successes and activities contained in this report and agree the organization is a good steward of the resources entrusted to it and its mission of *facilitating the health and wellness of health care professionals in order to enhance patient safety*.

A Message from the Chairman of the Board of the Ohio Physicians Health Program

As Board Chair of the Ohio Physicians Health Program I would like to thank everyone who helped us during the past year in our mission of facilitating the health and wellness of health care professionals in order to enhance patient safety. During 2008 OPHP had 205 new referrals and 480 active cases. Many people think of OPHP only works with individuals with substance use disorders. In 2008, 41% of referrals were for health issues such as: psychiatric and mental illness; aging; disruptive behavior; boundary issues; and others. In addition to serving health care professionals directly, OPHP regularly counsels with hospitals, hospital staffs and medical groups on how they might proceed when one of their professionals is having health issues that may affect his or her practice.

OPHP is a valuable resource of which many people are unaware. With funding from a grant from the Ohio Department of Drug and Addiction Services (ODADAS), OPHP provides educational seminars throughout the State (see inside back cover) to raise awareness of substance use disorders, the OPHP program and how it can assist professionals and organizations. During 2008 over eleven hundred physicians and other health care professionals attended one of these presentations. One message that I would like to give to any health professional experiencing health difficulties is to call OPHP. They are knowledgeable about resources that can

provide help and they are knowledgeable about our State Medical Board and the requirements of its rules and regulations in this area.

We are grateful to the Ohio Medical Quality Foundation, our largest supporter, for its continued grant of funds. We are also thankful to The Doctors Company, who is a long-term OPHP partner providing a substantial annual gift. I already mentioned the generous support of ODADAS. Finally I would like to thank the many hospitals and medical staffs who supported us as well as many individuals who opened their hearts to help heal our wounded professionals.

The tough economic times are putting more pressure on everyone. Physicians are no exception. We all need to support one another to get through this present challenge. You have supported OPHP and we are working to support as many health care professionals as we can.

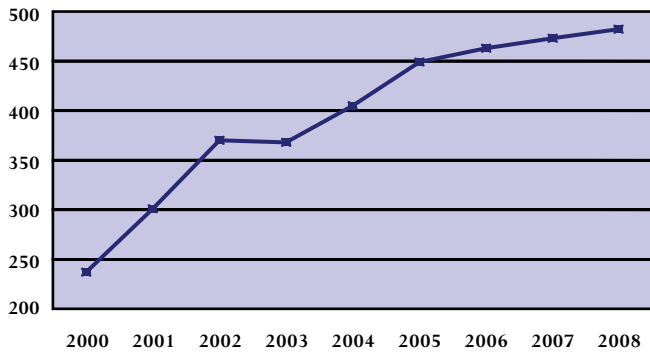

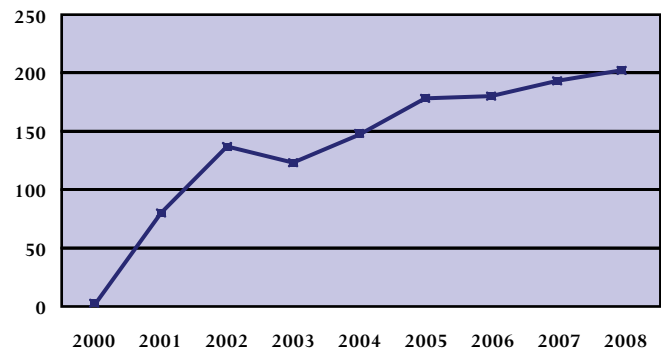
2008 Year in Review

There has been a 100% increase in active annual cases compared to the year 2000. Annual new referrals receiving services of consultation, intervention, referral, monitoring, education, recovery documentation, and advocacy increased to 205 compared to 57 in the year 2000.

Annual New Referrals**



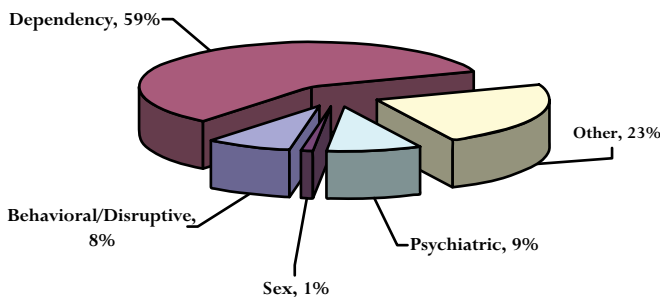
During the year the Ohio Physicians Health Program (OPHP) is contacted by a variety of individuals and institutions that have a concern about the health and well being of a healthcare practitioner or medical student. Though the majority of these contacts deal with concern about a possible substance use disorder, there are increasing amounts of contacts regarding: stress and burnout; aging; depression; disruptive behaviors; psychiatric or mental illness; practice re-entry; professional boundaries; and professional sexual misconduct.

Many cases do not require a signed monitoring agreement as the issues or concerns are addressed in various ways such as through referral for professional evaluation and/or treatment, education, coaching, support, etc.

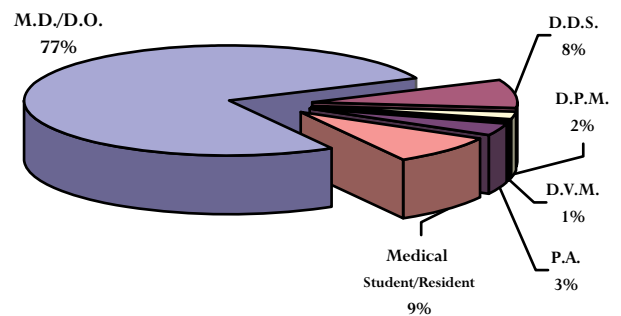
Most signed agreements are for monitoring and recovery documentation of a healthcare professional with a substance use disorder. Some of these participants may also have a co-occurring disorder, dual diagnosis, or other issues impacting their health and recovery.

the Ohio Physicians Health Program**

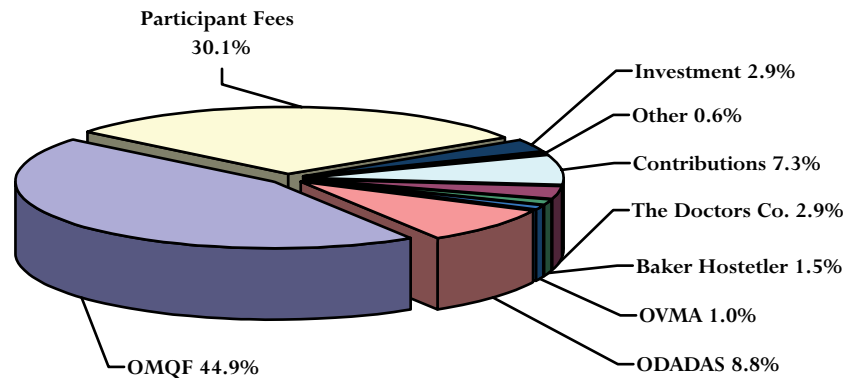


Signed Agreements by Professional Degree



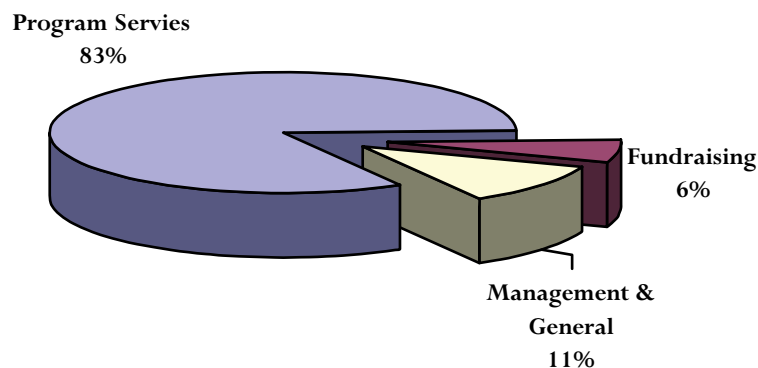
2008 Year in Review

2008 Revenue Sources



The Ohio Physicians Health Program's major source of funding is the Ohio Medical Quality Foundation (OMQF), providing 44.9 percent of total revenue in 2008. Participant fees accounted for 30.1 percent of OPHP's revenue in 2008. Other organizations providing financial support include the Ohio Department of Alcohol and Drug Addiction Services (ODADAS), The Doctors Company, Ohio Veterinary Medical Association (OMVA), and Baker & Hostetler LLP. Individual and institutional financial support, which includes annual giving, provided 7.3 percent of OPHP's total revenue.

2008 Functional Expenses



The Ohio Physicians Health Program is a responsible steward in the use of its resources as reflected in this functional expense pie chart. In 2008, 83 percent of OPHP's operational expense was in the actual delivery of services to physicians, residents, medical students, dentists, veterinarians, other healthcare professionals, hospitals, medical staff leaders, medical schools, and others.


